## Pupil Premium Report 2015/16

*Last updated 25/01/2016*

Pupil Premium is funding allocated to schools by the government. It is for schools to decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, as they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils at their school.

The level of the premium is currently £1,300 per eligible child. Eligible children are those on Free School Meals (FSM) and pupils in care who have been continuously looked after for six months.

**The total amount of pupil premium allocated in 2015-16 is £23,700 (2014-15 - £23,400)**

### **How this money is spent**

The targeted and strategic use of pupil premium may include:

- Quality first teaching provided by the teacher within class and quality interventions provided by support staff.
- Providing small group intervention work with experienced staff focussed on overcoming gaps in literacy and numeracy.
- One on one support from teaching assistants.
- Individual and small group intervention for children experiencing social and emotional difficulties.
- On the staff we provide specialists such as art therapists/play therapist.
- On the staff we provide specialist SEN and Speech and Language support to work with individual pupils.
- We provide 1:1 and small group targeted tuition from experience teachers for children at Key Stage 2 who are struggling to achieve the expected level by the end of the Key Stage.
- Further money from the budget, as needed, is added to the pupil premium to ensure that all pupils make the required progress and are properly supported in class.
- Subsidising curriculum enrichment activities.

The results illustrate effective use of the Pupil Premium Grant, with the school continuing to target and resource our Pupil Premium Students appropriately.

Compared to the national picture, however, Yesoiday HaTorah School receives minimal funding through this scheme as the illustration shows below, while at the same time has the highest quintile of SEN children attending. With the changes in SEN funding format, the financial implications for the school continue to be serious and a grave cause for concern.
